The Erdkinder Classroom went on their first field experience to the Alebrijes: Creatures of a Dream World exhibition at Cantigny Park in Wheaton. Alebrijes are incredibly colorful Mexican spirits, each one usually 2 or more animals smooshed together. They went on a 45-minute guided tour around the gardens, yet only saw a select number of the 40+ Alebrijes. The guide provided background about the origin of Alebrijes and the artists who made them. After the tour, the students broke into small groups and wrote observations in Spanish about their favorite Alebrije.

Interview with Ms. Huma - by David



would like to be a lawyer.




SCUPPLE BUNGS
