Classroom Focus: Mentoring Program

What is the Mentoring Program?

Here at MANH, our mentoring program is one of the many things that make our school unique. At the beginning of each year, the Erdkinder students are each assigned to a primary student from Ms.

Huma's class. Every Wednesday the Erdkinder class eats lunch with the primary class. The older students look after their mentees and make sure that they are following the rules, and having fun at the same time! Throughout the month, usually on Fridays, we all head to the art room to complete a simple art project set out by Ms. Meeta, the art teacher. Everyone loves this program, both the Erdkinder and primary students!

The students of the Erdkinder class also have mentors of their own. Every student is assigned a teacher as their mentor and they meet every two weeks to check in. During the meetings, students learn to properly manage their time, set reasonable goals, and/or plan extracurricular activities. More specifically, if a student feels that they are struggling with academics or even out of school, their mentors can help organize their thoughts and share ways to prevent unnecessary stress. With this program, both the students and teachers are able to build a stronger relationship while, ultimately, aiding in the construction of a beneficial environment.

Mentors and mentees meet twice each week: for lunch on Wednesdays and for large muscle play or art projects on Fridays. On Fridays while the weather remains pleasant, the students go outside and play together. They play catch with tennis balls and frisbees, run around, and play games which develop their large muscle skills. They also explore the outdoor environment, often examining leaves, bugs, and dirt. In the winter or on rainy days, they do art activities and crafts. These activities are all good for 3-, 4-, and 5-year-olds to do because they help them practice many important fine-motor skills, like how to hold and use a pencil, marker, or paintbrush and how to hold a scissors and cut paper. The Primary kids also learn to follow multi-step directions. The mentoring program is important because Erdkinder mentors and Primary mentees form meaningful bonds.

Mentoring is an important component of the MANH Erdkinder experience. Each student is paired with one of their teachers (mentor) with whom they are comfortable, and they meet privately several times each month. This safe 1:1 environment allows the student to comfortably open up. They talk about both in-school as well as out-of-school activities and goals. Additionally, students often feel overwhelmed, and mentor meetings help to quell their stressors. Teachers are a large part of each student's daily life, and their adult observations and ability to make changes in the community encourage positive growth in their mentee's habits and foster the success of each student.
