





A Day in the Life - by Kyle Riffner

Symbolizing sentences is a material which teaches students the parts of speech.
Sentence cards are provided, and the students are tasked with identifying the role of each word within the sentence, be it a noun, verb, article, adjective, etc. The students then place different colored shapes representing the various parts of speech over each word, and a teacher checks the student's work. Afterwards, the students record their answers in a notebook.
